This oversight negatively impacts both the well-being of the individuals involved and the standard of patient care delivered. The demand for healthcare services in Chandigarh consistently exceeds the capacity of medical institutions, putting their infrastructures, including personnel, under unnecessary strain. Patient attendants frequently serve as the backbone of caregiving in this overburdened system; however, they are subjected to uncertain working conditions, inconsistent pay, and the absence of benefits that are common in other positions. Moreover, the combination of consistent patient care and the social isolation that results from extended work hours frequently contributes to substantial mental health difficulties.

The objective of this study is to conduct a thorough analysis of the aforementioned socioeconomic challenges and an extensive examination of secondary sources of information, including scholarly articles, government reports, and healthcare organisation perspectives. The research classifies the challenges faced by attendants into economic, social, and psychological aspects, noting that these factors not only impact the well-being of the attendants but also the overall effectiveness of the healthcare system. Through an examination of how these obstacles interact with the role of

the attendant in providing care for patients, this study aims to emphasise the urgent requirement for orderly policy interventions. The primary objective of these interventions is to enhance functional conditions and support systems for patient attendants, with the ultimate goal of elevating the standard of healthcare services in Chandigarh and comparable metropolitan areas. The preceding section establishes the foundation for a more comprehensive examination of how socioeconomic barriers encountered by patient attendants influence the healthcare environment in urban India. It also delineates possible avenues for policy-oriented resolutions.

Review of Literature

Limited attention has been paid to the socioeconomic challenges experienced by patient attendants in healthcare settings globally. This literature review integrates findings from significant studies to establish a foundation for analysing the particular conditions present in Chandigarh. These studies provide an overview and shed light on the shared as well as unique aspects of the socioeconomic challenges that patient attendants face.

- An extensive investigation was undertaken by Patel, V. et al. (2021) and collaborators to examine the effects of irregular employment conditions on healthcare professionals in Mumbai, India. The study emphasises the considerable precariousness that employees experience as a result of unusual employment arrangements, such as contractual labour devoid of regular hours or benefits. These circumstances contribute to elevated levels of financial insecurity and tension among healthcare workers, which have a direct effect on their mental health and general well-being. This research holds significant relevance in elucidating the economic challenges that patient attendants in Chandigarh may encounter, considering the comparable employment practices observed in the healthcare sectors of the two regions.
- The analysis conducted by Chen (2020) on the economic challenges encountered by healthcare assistants in East Asia centres on the inequities in compensation systems and the lack of consistent working conditions. Chen demonstrates, using a survey-based methodology, how these economic challenges impede long-term personal and professional development and cause significant life stress. The insights provided by this study regarding the financial instabilities may contribute to the comprehension of comparable economic challenges that patient attendants in Chandigarh may encounter.

- A systematic review of the roles and challenges encountered by healthcare support personnel on a global scale was presented by Bowers, B. et al. (2018). The review emphasises the heterogeneity in job descriptions, obligations, and duties, which are factors in the variation in occupational risks and levels of job satisfaction. The text also addresses the pressing necessity for policy and practice modifications that are specifically relevant to the situation of patient attendants in Chandigarh and aim to standardise roles, enhance job satisfaction, and alleviate economic hardships.
- The research of Zhang, L. (2018) examines the correlation between health outcomes and working conditions for patient attendants in urban Shanghai from a critical perspective. The research employs a combination of quantitative and qualitative methodologies to evaluate the physiological and psychological consequences of extended work hours, insufficient rest, and inadequate workplace safety measures. The results of Zhang's study indicate a clear correlation between unfavourable working conditions and heightened occurrences of occupational diseases and mental health disorders. This supports the argument for improved regulatory supervision in healthcare environments and more stringent occupational health policies.
- Singh and D. Malhotra (2019) This research inquiry examines the dearth of easily obtainable benefits for healthcare support workers throughout Northern India, encompassing regions such as Chandigarh. Critical support systems, including health insurance, retirement benefits, and legal employment contracts, are conspicuously absent, according to the study. In addition to undermining employment security, this absence of institutional support further impinges on the financial and emotional well-being of the staff.
- In their study, Davies E. (2019) investigates the phenomenon of social isolation among elderly patient care assistants in the United Kingdom. Specifically, the authors highlight the challenges faced by these individuals, who are tasked with providing care for patients for extended periods with limited off-site interaction. Such isolation has significant psychological and social consequences, as evidenced by the study's focus on sadness and an absence of community and belonging. The aforementioned parallels illuminate comparable societal obstacles that patient attendants in Chandigarh might encounter, thereby emphasising the necessity for initiatives that foster community development and mental health support services.

- The case study conducted by Gupta and Kumar (2017) focuses on the psychological stressors that nurses in Chandigarh face. By doing so, it offers valuable insights into the wider mental health difficulties that patient attendants are likely to encounter. The research elucidates various elements, including work-life balance concerns, emotional exhaustion, and role conflict, that are further intensified by arduous work schedules and substantial patient burdens. The direct implications for patient attendants imply that comparable stressors may affect their psychological well-being and professional productivity.

- **Lack of Professional Recognition:** Despite their critical role, patient attendants often receive little professional recognition, which can impact their job satisfaction and motivation. This lack of recognition is similar to the work of stagehands in a theatre; essential to the performance but invisible to the audience.

Patient attendants in Chandigarh are indispensable to the healthcare sector, yet they navigate significant challenges that affect their economic stability, social well-being, and health. By understanding these challenges, stakeholders in the healthcare industry can better support these key workers, improving the quality of care for patients and creating a more sustainable healthcare

environment in the city. The demographic composition of patient attendants is experiencing a notable shift towards a younger workforce, as an increasing number of individuals from this age cohort are pursuing careers in this occupation. The aforementioned transition is propelled by the growing acknowledgement of caregiving as a feasible professional trajectory, bolstered by well-organized educational initiatives and the prospect of consistent job opportunities. The number of female patient attendants has experienced a significant rise, mostly influenced by the societal acknowledgement of caregiving as a traditionally female responsibility, as well as the economic imperative for families to have several sources of income. This phenomenon holds considerable importance within a geographical area where traditional gender norms have historically limited women's access to economic options beyond domestic spheres.

from a predominantly unnoticeable support role to a duly acknowledged and esteemed component of the healthcare system.

- **Health Risks:** Patient attendants face an elevated risk of experiencing physical and psychological health difficulties due to their continuous exposure to unwell patients and the presence of stressful work situations. The aforementioned health concerns are frequently exacerbated by the limited availability of sufficient healthcare services and protective measures for individuals.
- **Social isolation** might occur as a result of the hard nature of their employment, inconsistent hours, and the strong focus necessary. The state of isolation can have an impact on individual's mental well-being, resulting in heightened levels of stress, anxiety, and, in certain situations, depression.
- **Insufficient Acknowledgment and Assistance:** Patient attendants often experience an absence of respect for their professional contributions. The absence of official recognition

not only impacts the morale of healthcare professionals but also restricts their ability to avail professional rights and support systems that are offered to other healthcare workers.

Overall, Patient attendants in Chandigarh face socio-economic challenges, including financial rewards, skill development, and social networks. To improve their working conditions and ensure quality patient care, comprehensive policy interventions, enhanced employment contracts, better health protections, and increased social recognition are needed.

Policy and practice implications

The results of this study emphasise the immediate necessity for extensive policy changes to tackle the weaknesses experienced by patient attendants. One important suggestion is to establish a formal system of employment, which would ensure a consistent source of income and basic perks like health insurance and paid time off.
